RESEARCH INTERESTS

Currently, my research interests are influenced strongly by the classes I teach. Since July 1st, 2013 I have read one short story every calendar day to improve my critical faculties as a grader of fiction while enriching my understanding of the craft of fiction. I am currently revising a collection of intertwined short stories set in a Midwestern town, which I produced during a sabbatical in fall 2014, as well as producing new fiction.

I also edit and write a web site of whiskey journalism at www.middleshelfwhiskey.com, where we put whiskey into relationship with people, and into a context, in order to more fully grasp its spirit. I and my co-editor produce one article per month and have accumulated a following of three hundred regular, unique readers per month.

Finally, I read philosophy and theory in preparation for applying to Ph. D. programs for fall 2017. Having made my way through Heidegger and Foucault, I have turned toward hermeneutics most recently with Gadamer's *Philosophical Hermeneutics*. I plan to propose a research project on how contemporary humans practice and experience sacrifice, emphasizing the practices that link ancient ideas and manifestations of sacrifice to our contemporary context in surprising but largely unacknowledged ways.
